Dr. Joseph Berechman
City University of New York

Dr. Joseph Berechman is the Marvin Kristein Professor in the Department of Economics and Business at the Colin Powell School, the City College of New York. Between 2007 and 2014 he was the Department's Chairman.

Before coming to CCNY he was the CN Chair Professor in Transportation and International Logistics at the Sauder School of Business, the University of British Columbia, Canada. Dr. Berechman received his Bachelor degree from the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, Israel, his MBA from the Wharton School and PhD degree from the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia. Subsequently, he was on the faculty of SUNY Buffalo, Tel-Aviv University and the University of California, Irvine. He also was a Fellow at The Netherlands Institute for Advanced Studies. Dr. Berechman has consulted on a variety of transportation and urban projects in different countries and has been a principal investigator in several major studies done for the European Union. For the past several years he is engaged in major cost and investment studies of transportation infrastructure projects in New York and elsewhere. He has published numerous journal papers and five books. Dr. Berechman's current research interests focus on transportation infrastructure investment evaluation and decision-making; and the relationships between transportation development and regional and national economic growth.

Dr. Matti Siemiatycki is Associate Professor in the Department of Geography and Program in Planning at the University of Toronto. He holds a Ph.D in urban planning from the University of British Columbia and a

Master's in Geography from Oxford University. His teaching and research focuses on infrastructure planning, financing and project delivery. His recent studies explore the merits of delivering infrastructure mega-projects through public-private partnerships, especially as they relate to value for money, risk transfer, and the meeting of public policy goals. During his time on Toronto City Council, he chaired Toronto's Planning and Growth Committee, served as TTC Commissioner for eight years, served as a Member of The City of Toronto Executive Committee and as a member of BUILD Toronto. Milczyn also served as a member of several Business Improvement Areas in Etobicoke. A vocal champion for the expansion of public transit, planning reform and the provision of affordable housing for families in Etobicoke-Lakeshore and across Ontario, his experience and knowledge in the area of responsible city building, fiscally responsible, efficient government, and urban planning led to his introduction of Private Member's Bill 39: An Act to amend the City of Toronto Act, 2006, the Planning Act and certain regulations. The Bill aims to restore local decision making and provide municipalities with the tools to generate more affordable housing in partnership with the province.
