Hon. Glen Murray

Ministry of Transportation and Ministry of Infrastructure Government of Ontario Toronto, Ontario, Canada

Glen Murray was appointed the Minister of Infrastructure and the Minister of Transportation in February 2013. He served as mayor of Winnipeg from 1998 to 2004. He has had a lifetime of

activism in urban planning, sustainable development and community health. He has served on several university, hospital and community boards and is a founding member of the Canadian AIDS Society. Murray served as mayor of the City of Winnipeg from 1998 to 2004. As Chair of the Big City Mayors' Caucus, he led the successful campaign to transfer the equivalent of five cents per litre of the federal gas tax to municipalities for infrastructure renewal and construction. In 2004, he moved to Toronto and served as Senior Resident at Massey College and a Visiting Fellow at the Faculty of Architecture and Landscape Design at the University of Toronto. He was appointed Chair of the National Round Table on the Environment and the Economy by former Prime Minister Paul Martin in 2005. Murray became president and CEO of the Canadian Urban Institute in 2007.



Geoff Cross

TransLink Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada

Geoff's team at TransLink leads the development of the objectives and policies for managing Metro Vancouver's regional transportation system. Their diverse mandate includes policies, pricing and funding for areas such as transit service, rapid transit and major infrastructure, bicycle and pedestrian planning, network demand and parking

management, street and urban design associated with integrated land use and transit oriented communities planning. Previously, Geoff managed the development of TransLink's 10-Year strategic plans that most recently included the approval and funding for the new Evergreen rapid transit line and other expansion initiatives. That plan established a new performance-based prioritization tool that has guided how the organization's investment decisions are made. Before joining TransLink, Geoff worked for public, private and non-profit sectors of the sustainable transportation field in Wisconsin, Arizona and Oregon. He holds a BA in Economics and an MA in Planning.



Cameron Gordon University of Canberra Canberra, ACT, Australia

Cameron Gordon is an Associate Professor of Economics at the University of Canberra and a visiting Senior Research Fellow at the University of New South Wales, Australian Defence Force Academy Business School. He also has ongoing research appointments with the

University Transportation Research Center, Region 2 and the City University of New York Social Policy Simulation Center, both in New York City. Professor Gordon has held prior academic appointments in Finance at the City University of New York and in Public Administration at the University of Southern California. He has had a long public service career prior to entering academia, including stints with the US Congress Joint Committee on Taxation; US Army Corps of Engineers; US Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations (USACIR); and the New York City Municipal Water Finance Authority. Professor Gordon's research focuses on transport finance, public private partnerships, economic development and urban freight and passenger infrastructure and management. He earned a PhD in Economics from City University of New York, with specializations in Economic History and Public Economics.



Rob Hatton City of Toronto Toronto, Ontario, Canada

Rob Hatton is a municipal finance professional with over twenty years in the business, primarily at the City of Toronto. He has traditional municipal experience with rate setting policies – property taxes, water rates and development charges. The introduction of the City of Toronto Act 2006 broadened his involvement into assessing

and in some cases implementing new taxes such as the land transfer tax, vehicle registration tax, sign tax, and various road user pricing options. Recently the City has revived discussion of road pricing and other revenue options in or to provide comment to Metrolinx in the run up to the release of its June 1 2013 Investment Strategy report of funding the next wave of the Big Move regional transportation plan. Rob was educated at Queen's University (B.A.Sc) and the University of British Columbia (MBA).



David Lewis HDR Decision Economics Toronto, Ontario, Canada

Dr. David Lewis is Senior Vice President and Principal Economic Advisor with HDR Decision Economics, and serves as Adjunct Professor in the School of Policy and Public Administration at Carleton University. He served previously as President and CEO of HLB Decision Economics (acquired by HDR in 2005) prior to which

he was a Principal Economist of the U.S. Congressional Budget Office and Chief Economist of the Office of the Auditor General of Canada. He trained at the London School of Economics where he studied and published with Professor Stephen Glaister on Cost-Benefit Analysis and Second-Best optimal transportation pricing. He is the recipient of the Saltzman Prize of the Journal of Policy Analysis and Management; the Transportation Research Board's William G. Bell Award; and the Elmer Staats Award (Journal of International Auditing). He was elected a Fellow of the Institute of Logistics and Transport in 2003 and an Emeritus Member of the Transportation Research Board in 2006. His 1999 book, "Policy and Planning as Public Choice: Mass Transit in the United States" (co-authored by Dr. Fred Williams) is a quantitative accounting of the benefits of public transportation in relation to mobility, disability, congestion management and economic development.



Robin Lindsey

Dr. Lindsey's research interests include road pricing, traffic congestion models, paying for roads, traveler risk aversion and advanced traveler information systems. He has participated in several European Union projects concerned with efficient transportation pricing, usage of user charge revenues, and institutional factors in

transport policy implementation. Dr. Lindsey has also studied private provision of roads and other topics related to market structure and efficiency. He holds a Ph.D in economics from Princeton University as well as an M.A. and B.A. (Economics and Physics) from Queen's University.

José Manuel Vassallo is Associate Professor in the Transportation Department at the Civil Engineering School at the Universidad Politécnica de Madrid. He is also a member of the academic staff of the Transportation Research Centre (TRANSyT) where he leads the

Last year he was appointed research fellow at the Harvard Kennedy School of Government where he worked with Professor Gómez-Ibáñez. José has also worked for several institutions, including the World Bank, the Government of Chile, the Andean Corporation of Development, and the European Conference of Ministers of Transportation.

Dr. Martin Wachs is Adjunct Senior Principal Researcher and former Director of the Transportation, Space, and Technology Program at the RAND Corporation. He is also Professor Emeritus of Civil & Environmental Engineering and of City & Regional Planning at the

University of California, Berkeley, where he directed the Institute of Transportation Studies. He earlier spent 25 years at UCLA, where he was Chairman of the Department of Urban Planning. He is currently teaching courses on transportation policy economics at UCLA. Wachs is the author of 170 articles and four books on subjects related to transportation finance and economics, relationships between transportation, land use, and air quality, transportation needs of the elderly, techniques for the evaluation of transportation systems, and the use of performance measurement in transportation planning. His research also addresses, equity in transportation policy, crime in public transit systems, and the response of transportation systems to natural disasters including earthquakes.
